The population being 65,000 and the standard ratio of 1:10 homosexual/heterosexual). Our programme will continue to deliver culturally appropriate HIV/AIDS education and prevention materials and services to promote a health lifestyle in urban Aboriginal gay and lesbian community. This initiative will include: bi-monthly 'talking circles' for people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS, a newsletter, The Sacred Fire, reproduction and distribution of our video, In the Spirit of Our Grandmothers, a referral and counselling service, development of a Hotline, community workshops and forums, and the development of a brochure and poster.	1991
AAN (AIDS Action Now)	An activist organization fighting for improved treatment, care and support for people living with AIDS and HIV infection. We work to transform HIV infection into a chronic manageable illness by making the research, health care and social service systems deliver optimal treatment.	1990

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Anishnawbe Health Toronto	Presently, ANISHNAWBE HEALTH TORONTO offers a Native AIDS prevention project and is responsible for the development, coordination and implementation of a culture-based HIV/AIDS community education and prevention activities designed for the Native population in the Toronto area. The Native AIDS Prevention project also offers HIV/AIDS presentations to community groups/organizations; one to one counselling for Native people who are infected and affected by HIV/AIDS; and the distribution of Native specific resource materials posters, pamphlets, condoms/condom jackets, coasters. AHT is a designated Needle Exchange providing safer needle use education, needle exchange and bleach kits. Anonymous HIV Anti-body Testing is another offering both pre/post test counselling service. Black Coalition for AIDS Prevention (BLACKCAP)	BLACK CAP provides education to the culturally diverse black communities to prevent the spread of HIV infection. We also provide support and counselling for members of the black communities who are infected and affected by HIV disease.	1990

Community Research Initiative/Toronto	The Community Research Initiative/Toronto is a consortium of primary care physicians who treat the majority of people with HIV in the Toronto area. The consortium was formed in 1989 by community physicians in an effort to establish research of promising experimental treatments for HIV/AIDS related opportunistic infections. CRIT's clinical trials are designed to be conducted in private physicians' offices and community clinics. A Clinical Trials Coordinator works with physicians by identifying eligible patients, obtaining informed consent, completing case report forms and reporting any adverse reactions. In addition, CRIT maintains an observational database which is an unprecedented international collaborative effort to compile information on the progression of HIV infection.	1992
Downtown Churchworkers' Association AIDS Programme	In cooperation with community organizations and individuals, the Downtown Churchworkers' Association initiates supportive and educational projects and programmes to increase AIDS awareness. DCA also provides access to community and spiritual support to people living with HIV/AIDS, and advocates on issues of social justice.	1991
Fife House	Fife House Foundations Inc. provides rent-geared-to-income shared housing for people with HIV. Staff provide counselling, advocacy, and some practical support.	1990

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Gay Asian AIDS Project	Gay Asian AIDS project is a non-profit community based organization that provides support, counselling, and education for gay Asian men. Our services include providing information on safer sex and HIV/AIDS prevention, pre and post test counselling, treatment and support services information, supportive counselling, buddy support, referrals, coordination of services and advocacy.	1991
Hassle Free Clinic	Hassle Free Clinic provides anonymous HIV Anti-body testing as well as pre and post test counselling to its clients. Health promotion and illness prevention is accomplished through safer sex counselling and up to date information on AIDS treatments. Within the bath programme, STD testing and safer sex education is available. Haemophilia Ontario	The TCOR AIDS Support Services programme is TCOR's response to our community's needs and concerns. The goal of the programme is to improve the quality of life for members of the haemophilia community and the general public impacted by HIV and AIDS., The programme uses the acronym SPACE to describe the five components which make up the wide range of service we offer. Support, Prevention, Advocacy, Counselling, Education. SPACE has five objectives: to access available support services; prevent the further spread of HIV and further progression of AIDS within the target population; advocate on behalf of the target population; provide four counselling and coping skills and provide reliable information on HIV, AIDS, haemophilia and the blood industry. The target population community which consists of persons with haemophilia, their parents, partners, children and other family members. This includes psychiatric assessment, individual psychotherapy tailored to the needs of the patient, couple and family therapy, group therapy and neuropsychological assessment. We also consult to other services such as inpatient medicine and Casey House Hospice. We include home based psychiatric care for home bound patients.	1990
